This program requires 30 credit hours, a written and oral comprehensive exam, foreign language exam (or comparable course) and a thesis. Use this check sheet and guide to help you navigate through your degree program and to assist you with filing your Plan of Study (required by the university).

Required Core (13 credit hours)

One theory course (3 credits) must be an analytical course (MTC prefix). The second theory course (2-3 credits) may be a non-analytical course. MTC 520 Analytical Techniques is recommended, especially if you plan to complete a PhD. Two courses in Ethnomusicology ensembles must be taken with the second course concurrently with MHL 592.

Tips on Selecting Coursework

At least 20 credit hours must be in the field of ethnomusicology or related fields approved by the faculty advisor, complemented by courses in music theory, performance and cultural anthropology.

Each semester, the courses offered in musicology (MHL) and music theory (MTC) are listed on the MDT Graduate student Resources site. Graduate coursework must be taken at the 500-level or above. Courses are offered on a rotational basis and are not necessarily offered every semester. The MTC courses are identified as either an analytical or non-analytical course.

Degree Timeline and Check list

- All work toward a master's degree must be completed within six consecutive years of the semester of entry.
- You must remained enrolled in each fall and spring semester until the degree is completed.

Oral Comprehensive Exam	Scheduled after written exam is complete. Can be scheduled in same semester as the written exam or in a later semester as approved by the committee.
Identify a Thesis Topic	Can be done as early as the first semester and should be decided by beginning of the third semester.
Complete IRB training, if required	Must be done before any human subject research is conducted.

Graduate Coursework Curriculum Breakdown

Every course taken for a master's degree must have a graduate course number (500+). You will not receive graduate credit for courses at the 400-level or below. You may take courses at the 400-level or below, but the courses will not count toward your degree. When courses are double listed under both 400-level and 500-level numbers, always take the 500-level section. The MA degree in Music is accredited through the National Association for Schools of Music (NASM) and meets the curricular requirements as indicated below.
